New Delhi: Jan Aushadhi Diwas shows India's commitment to provide quality and affordable medicines for all people, said Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Friday. Every year, March 7th is celebrated as 'Jan Aushadhi Diwas' to raise awareness about the scheme and promote the use of generic medicines. PM Modi noted that the initiative will help towards building a healthy and fit nation. "Jan Aushadhi Diwas reflects our commitment to provide top quality and affordable medicines to people, ensuring a healthy and fit India," he shared in a post on social media platform X.

Jan Aushadhi Kendras, set up under the Pradhan Mantri Jan Aushadhi Pariyojana (PMBJP), is a public welfare scheme, that provides quality medicines at affordable prices to the masses. Launched in November 2008, the Scheme is being implemented through the Pharmaceuticals and Medical Devices Bureau of India (PMBI).

Ensuring universal health care with Jan Aushadhi Kendras

Medicines protect health and save lives. But medicines cost money and spending on them constitutes a major component of out-of-pocket expenditure. To alleviate this stress on citizens, the government provides free medicines through public hospitals and through over 1.7 lakh Ayushman Arogya Mandirs. Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Arogya Yojana (AB PMJAY) provides free inpatient care, including all the necessary medicines, to over 55 crore individuals. Prices of many essential drugs are also regulated.

These efforts have contributed to a consistent decline in out-of-pocket expenditure — from 64% of the total health expenditure in 2013-14 to 39% in 2021-22. But more needs to be done to further reduce the financial burden on health care.

The larger objective of the Pradhan Mantri Bhartiya Jan- aushadhi Pariyojana (PMBJP) is precisely this. PMBJP aims to provide quality generic medicines through a network of Jan Aushadhi Kendras (JAKS). Presently, more than 15,000 such outlets are operating across 776 districts delivering health benefits to approximately one million people every single day. The product range of JAKS covers 2,047 medicines and 300 surgical and health care items. The medicines sold at JAKS are on average 50% to 80% cheaper than their branded counterparts sold in the open market.

Over 15,000 Jan Aushadhi Kendras opened nationwide under Pradhan Mantri Bhartiya Janaushadhi Pariyojana



The Pradhan Mantri Bhartiya Janaushadhi Pariyojana (PMBJP) has seen significant growth, with a total of 15,057 Jan Aushadhi Kendras (JAKs) opened across the country as of February 28, according to a statement released by the Ministry of Chemicals and Fertilizers on Tuesday.

These Jan Aushadhi Kendras, spread across various States and Union Territories, aim to provide affordable generic medicines to the public. The initiative is designed to ensure that essential medicines are available at significantly lower prices, making healthcare more accessible to the masses.

The Ministry confirmed that there is no systemic issue regarding the availability of medicines at JAKs. To ensure a smooth supply chain, an end-to-end IT-enabled system has been implemented. This system includes one central warehouse located in Gurugram and four regional warehouses situated in Bengaluru, Guwahati, Chennai, and Surat. Additionally, 36 distributors have been appointed across the country to further bolster the supply chain.

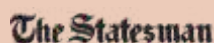

NEW DELHI: In a significant step towards transforming India's healthcare landscape, the government's 'Pradhan Mantri Bhartiya Janaushadhi Pariyojana' (PMBJP) has been a game-changer for the ordinary people. Despite strong opposition, the scheme has successfully reduced out-of-pocket healthcare expenses for millions of families, providing affordable medicines to those in need. Those who wish to open a store must have a minimum of 120 square feet of space and a qualified pharmacist with an eligible degree. Additionally, women and individuals from backward communities are encouraged to open these stores, with the government offering a subsidy of Rs 2 lakh to support their entrepreneurial efforts.

Delhi govt mandates purchase of medicines from PM Jan Aushadhi Kendra restricting local procurement



Delhi Health Minister Dr. Pankaj Kumar Singh on Wednesday announced the approval of the Delhi government's decision to mandate procurement of medicines from Pradhan Mantri Jan Aushadhi Kendras (PMBJK) instead of relying on local purchases, unless absolutely necessary.

This initiative is in line with the government's commitment to ensuring cost-effective and high-quality medicines for all citizens of Delhi while promoting transparency in procurement processes.

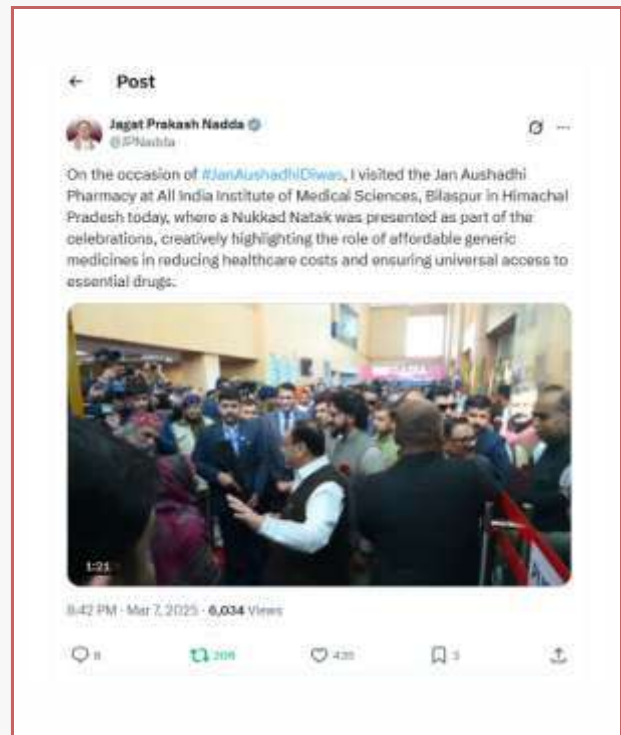
This move follows the minister's review meeting on March 6 at the Delhi Secretariat where he had directed all medical superintendents and health officials to take expeditious action towards streamlining medicine procurement through PMBJK under the Department of Pharmaceuticals, Government of India.

The directive emphasized the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with an authorized channel partner of PM-Jan Aushadhi Kendras to facilitate seamless procurement across all government hospitals in Delhi.

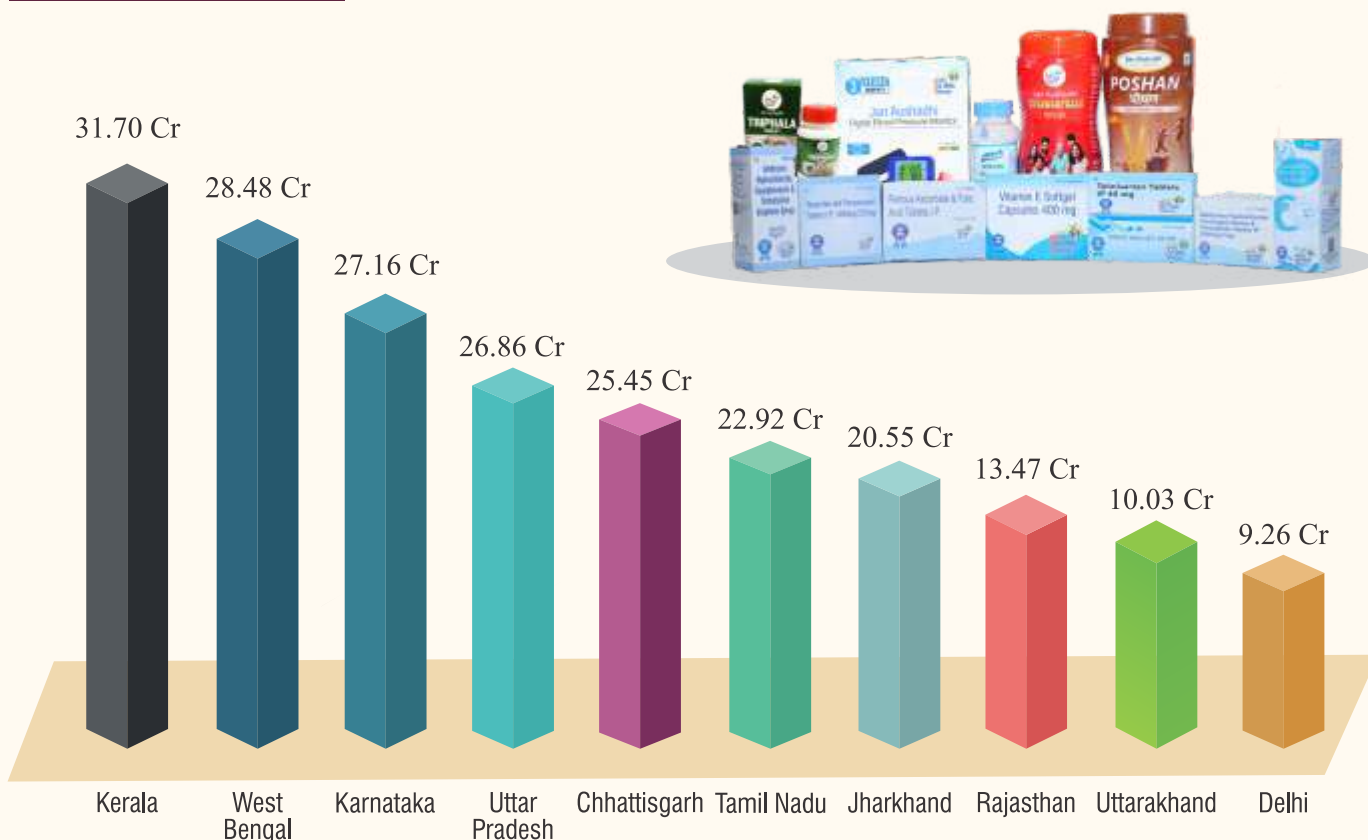

Fatty Liver Disease (FLD)

Fatty liver disease (FLD), also known as hepatic steatosis, involves excess fat accumulation in the liver, often without symptoms. Over time, it can impair liver function.

Metabolic Dysfunction - Associated Steatotic Liver Disease (MASLD):

known as nonalcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD). Risk factors include obesity and metabolic disorders. It has two forms:

Simple Fatty Liver:

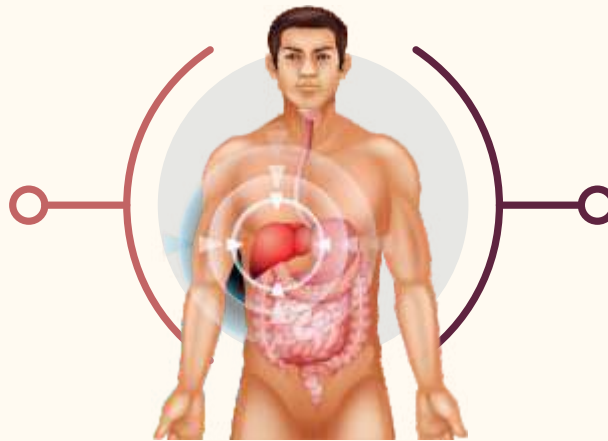
Fat accumulation without inflammation or damage.

Metabolic Dysfunction-Associated

Steatohepatitis (MASH):

Inflammation and potential liver damage, leading to serious complications like cirrhosis and liver cancer.

Types of Fatty Liver Disease



Alcohol-Related Fatty Liver Disease (ALD):

Less common, it arises from excessive alcohol consumption.

Stopping alcohol can reverse the condition, but ongoing drinking can lead to significant liver issues such as alcoholic hepatitis and cirrhosis.

Symptoms

Generally, FLD is symptomless. If symptoms arise (more likely in MASH or cirrhosis), they may include:



Abdominal swelling



Enlarged blood vessels



Jaundice
(yellowing of skin/eyes)



Fatigue, nausea,
weight loss

Risk Factors

For ALD, causes mainly include high alcohol consumption, obesity, malnutrition, and certain demographic factors like age and ethnicity.



Diagnosis

Diagnosis is often through medical history, physical exams, and tests for liver function and BMI, as many have no symptoms.



Treatment

Primary treatment for FLD is weight loss (3-5% body weight), which can reduce liver fat and inflammation. Alcohol abstinence is essential. In severe cases, a liver transplant may be necessary.

Alternative Treatments

Vitamin E:

May reduce inflammation but requires caution with dosage.

Coffee:

Linked to improved liver health but mechanisms aren't fully understood.

Olive Oil:

Healthy fat that may reduce liver fat and inflammation.

Reversing Fatty Liver Disease

FLD can be reversed through lifestyle changes, including avoiding alcohol and maintaining a healthy weight, as the liver can regenerate damaged tissue.
